February Meeting Notes

C-11 Report: Officer Mike Keaney noted that there were very few documented incidents in the last month, mostly property crimes: an attempted housebreak on Ashmont Street resulted in a damaged front door but nothing was taken; air freshener was stolen from a car on Ashmont; a front passenger window was smashed on Ocean Street but nothing was taken. It was noted that two other cars had windows smashed that same time; they were not reported so there was no record. Warmer weather may bring an uptick, so as always keep cars locked and valuables out of sight. Spring also brings out motorbikes; call 911 to report problems with them: police will not pursue for safety reasons but if an address associated with bike activity is provided they will follow up.

1857 Dorchester Avenue development proposal: Steve Connelly and his attorney, Kevin Cloutier, described the development that Connelly Construction proposes to build on their property on Dot Ave: 20 rental units (four 1BR, 16 2BR, with three set aside for lowincome tenants), plus two retail spaces that they plan to use for their offices. They have been in this location for 20 years; own and manage a number of properties. Project will require BPDA and ZBA approvals. Comments included concerns about the amount of parking provided (too much/too little), lack of active retail in the commercial spaces, blank wall facing the adjoining condos to the south. BPDA community process is underway; presentation to AHA was informational.

Slow Streets Application: The Boston Transportation Department is accepting applications city-wide for Slow Streets projects that would address pedestrian, cycling, and auto safety on neighborhood streets. (Pilot project was carried out in the Norfolk Triangle area west of Codman Square.) Application process involves community input re; general concerns, obtaining support from elected officials and local businesses and institutions. Ashmont Hill, Ashmont Valley (Fuller/Bailey neighborhood) and Peabody Slope (from Mercier to Gallivan) have decided to apply jointly in order to address concerns more comprehensively. (Councilor Campbell noted that such collaboration is the kind of approach the City is looking for.) AHA Board member Sean Wheeler is taking the lead for the neighborhood in coordinating the application process. A joint community meeting will be held on March 16, 7-8 p.m., at the Dorchester Y. Application deadline is March 24.

Councilor Andrea Campbell: Noted that in her campaign she committed to reporting regularly to the district on her progress in carrying out her stated goals; her six-month report was issued in January. She also publishes a newsletter and sends out periodic (but not too many) emails. She can be reached at 617-635-3131 or andrea .campbell@boston.gov; don't hesitate to contact her to receive these communications or if there is any way in which her office can be of assistance. Eli Pimentel from the Councilor's staff reported that there will be a meeting on March 1 re: DND's parcels at Washington and Euclid.

Rep. Russell Holmes: Discussed corrections issues; how to reduce recidivism, providing education and other programs for incarcerated individuals rather than solving problems on exit rather than anticipating; also providing housing. He also discussed mandatory minimums; said small number entering



Also concerned with bail reform: people being locked up extensively because they can't make bail; we are often spending more to keep them in than the amount of the bail. MA has the second lowest incarceration rate nationwide.
