Spring Service Day

The Martin Richard Foundation brings families and communities together in service at their annual Spring Service Day on Sunday, May 19. This year's theme is creating a better world for young people. The Foundation's mission, to help young people learn, grow and lead through volunteerism and community engagement, will be brought to life through four service projects managed and executed by young people, for young people.

The four service opportunities are:

- 1) Brighten up a meeting space at the Louis D. Brown Peace Institute (15 Christopher Street)
- 2) Renovate indoor and outdoor spaces at St. Ambrose Family Inn (25 Leonard Street): the second-floor play room and the front and back garden beds and playground.

April Meeting Notes

Andrea Campbell, City Councilor for District 4 (which includes Ashmont Hill) and current Council President. spoke about a number of matters relating to her work and community, including the recent shootings in Mattapan. The Council is in budget hearings until June, looking at a \$3.5 billion budget; the education budget, school performance and resources, Slow Streets, the need for more data and enforcement, are on her radar. She is not in favor of charging for resident parking permits. She is visiting schools outside the district to see if they offer ideas for Boston. She supports changing the term for City Councilors from two years to four years, to increase parity with the mayoral term. She is pushing to improve blighted and vacant City-owned properties; she and Senator Collins are pushing for funding for a Main Streets beat cop.

Joy Gary, the new Program Assistant and Market Manager for Greater Ashmont Main Street, noted that planning is moving along for the Ashmont Farmers Market, which opens on Friday, June 28, but they are still looking for vendors. She can be reached at 617-825-3846 or programs@greater ashmont.org.

Christina Metcalfe, Greater Ashmont MS treasurer, described some of the organization's activities: the DotJazz Series, the Bike and Brew Festival, the crowdfunding effort that helped make the just-completed Peabody Square revitalization possible, and the startup of the DotGreenway effort. Committees include Beautification and Public Spaces, Development and Historic Preservation, Fundraising and Events, and Business Support and Improvement. Neighbors are always welcome to get involved; go to greaterashmont .org for more information.


