Many thanks to Lex Stevens and David Stitt for hosting the January meeting, which was well attended despite the terrible weather.

The next AHA meeting is on Thursday, February 22, 7:30 p.m., at 49
Roslin Street, hosted by Mike and Carole Horne. On the agenda: neighbors at 11R Alban Street will present their plans to replace their back deck and will ask for AHA's support for the necessary zoning variances; the developer and architect for 500 Talbot Avenue (Our Saviour's Lutheran Church) will give an update on their plans for housing on the site; and Evandro Carvalho, a candidate in the special election to fill Linda Dorcena Forry's recently vacated State Senate seat, will introduce himself.

Neighbors sometimes ask why the C-11 police report is at the start of every AHA meeting. Some find it upsetting or negative, while others find it dreary or boring. While we can't answer every concern, we do try to keep neighbors informed about what happens in the neighborhood in hopes of avoiding the avoidable. January Meeting Notes

The C -11 monthly report included the arrest of a young man seen trying to get into a Roslin Street property and later found in the garage, and a drug arrest at Washington and Roslin after the driver of the car was stopped for running a red light. A neighbor was followed home from Ashmont Station by a tall man with a strawberry blond beard early one afternoon in January and called home to say she was concerned; the man ran off after she arrived home. Police responded to a Shotspotter alert on Welles Avenue on Jan. 21 but found no evidence or witnesses. A number of convenience store robberies have occurred in the last couple of months, by different groups, but there have been no arrests as yet.

Sgt. Brian Dunford gave a brief presentation about the CamShare program that is being piloted in Dorchester, in which business owners and residents volunteer to provide images from their security cameras to help in solving crimes. There was discussion about the best cameras; no one system was recommended, but neighbors might be a source of suggestions. Privacy issues are potential concern as security cameras are proliferating. A group of Ashmont Street neighbors has submitted a proposal to the City's Love Your Block program for funding to provide trash barrels along Ashmont Street, in collaboration with the Y, TechBoston, and Norfolk Hardware. A decision is expected in February.

Dave Cotter from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services said that the Mayor is filing an ordinance to regulate AirBNBs because of the concern that such short-term rentals are taking regular rental housing off the market: more than 1500 units in the city are rented more than 300 days a year, more than 2500 are rented more than 117 days/year. The ordinance will be submitted soon. Eli Pimentel from Councilor Campbell's office announced that Andrea has been elected president of the City Council. Some \$250,000 in youth development grants has been awarded to eleven recipients. Rep. Russell Holmes reported that the Casey Overpass project at Forest Hills is nearing completion, and the train station at Cummins Highway should be completed in about a year. He is considering whether to run for Senator Forry's seat. (He later decided not to.)


