March Meeting Notes

Susan Cascino from the Office of the Environment talked about Boston's efforts to reduce waste and increase recycling. Many people do "wishful recycling," putting dirty or unacceptable items in recycling. The recycling rate in Massachusetts is currently 21%; it would be 40% if guidelines were followed. The Mass. Department of Environmental Protection has started an initiative to standardize recycling statewide. We need to work with domestic markets to feed recyclables into local or regional manufacturing, and trying to get manufacturers to take responsibility for end-of-life recycling of products. Go to to RecycleSmart-MA.org to learn more about what to recycle; also go to boston.gov and search on Recycling.

Joe Katusich from the Martin Richard Foundation described their Spring Day of Service on Sunday, May 19, 12 to 4 p.m., with the theme of building a better future for young people. Activities will take place mainly at the Edward M. Kennedy Institute but also at sites around Dorchester. The Foundation is participating in the Mother's Day Walk for Peace on May 12, with the goal of raising \$15,000. Info: martinrichardfoundation.org or joe@martinrichardfoundation.org.

James Hobin, the art teacher at Boston International High School in Dorchester, described the 10x20-foot, oil-on-canvas mural called "The Peaceable Kingdom" that his students are creating. He plans to make a proposal to the MBTA to have it installed on the brick wall at the south entrance to Ashmont Station. as part of the T's Temporary Art and Temporary Community/ Youth Mural Program, and is asking for AHA's support. Those present voted unanimously in favor of AHA sending a letter of support to the T.

Elle Ducheine and James Guerrier from Ripple Cafe in The Carruth described their vision of creating a community gathering space. They offer sustainable grown coffees and teas, baked goods, smoothies, yogurt parfaits, and more. Hours are Monday– Friday, 7 a.m.–7 p.m.; Saturday, 8 a.m.–4 p.m.

Matt Thayer from American Provisions in the Treadmark building described how he and business partner Andy Fadous opened their first shop in South Boston eight years ago. They both live locally and are excited to be in our neighborhood now. They offer wine and beer, cheeses and charcuterie, sandwiches, specialty foods, and more. Peabody Square Ribbon-Cutting

Come celebrate the beautifully revitalized Peabody Square at a ribbon-cutting with city officials on Friday, April 26, at 11 a.m. Funding to make the redesigned East and West Plazas a reality was a true community effort: Greater Ashmont Main Street led a crowdfunding campaign with Patronicity that secured donations from 135 friends, neighbors and Dorchester small businesses. This allowed the project to secure matching funds from Mass Development's Commonwealth Places Fund, the Boston Main Streets Foundation, and additional support from the Martin Richard Foundation, Peregrine Group, and Trinity Financial. Topped off with a grant from the Amelia Peabody Charitable Fund. The total raised was an amazing \$96,430!
