Peabody Square Revitalization Starting Soon

Construction is expected to begin soon on the Peabody Square Revitalization project, which includes landscape improvements to create more usable, appealing, and sustainable community spaces. The culmination of several years of visioning, fundraising, design, and public approvals, under the direction of Greater Ashmont Main Street, the work is expected to take about four weeks.

On the west side, by the Ashmont Grill, game tables, new plantings including a London Plane tree, and a Soofa Sign electronic display for community notices will be introduced, with picnic tables added in the Spring. On the east side, by the Peabody Square Clock, new benches will be installed within a small green space with perennial and annual plantings. Several new bike racks and a repair station will make cycling more convenient. Other features include new trash and recycling receptacles, repairs to the granite walkways, and new paving designs to enhance safety and provide sustainable green space around the plaza.

September Meeting Notes

Laurie Fisher of 28 Roslin Street requested support for the variances she needs to add a dormer window on her third floor as part of a bathroom renovation, which would make the floor area ratio excessive. It was moved, seconded, and passed with a unanimous vote, that AHA should write a letter of support to the Zoning Board of Appeal in advance of her hearing on October 18.

Mike Ahearn described his proposal for a 56-unit rental apartment building with two commercial spaces on the property he owns at 1970 Dorchester Avenue, adjacent to Ashmont Station. As the project is a transit-oriented development, the only parking would be five spaces for commercial tenants and maintenance. Questions were asked about parking (what would keep residents from getting resident parking stickers), size of the building, affordable units, anticipated rents, and retail uses. The project is still in preliminary stages with the BPDA, so many details remain to be worked out.

Mr. Allahverdi, owner of 80-88 Welles Avenue, and his architect Bill Paquette presented plans to replace the vacant and fire-damaged one-story building on the site with a three-story building with nine residential units, three commercial spaces, and eight parking spaces accessed off Wainwright Street. Questions were asked about the tightness of the parking, dumpster location, lack of green space, possibility of solar, exterior materials and design, affordable units (too few units for any to be required), and current maintenance issues. A motion was made, seconded, and approved to send a letter of support from AHA to the ZBA, with a request that neighbors be shown a more developed and refined design for the building, perhaps at the time when the BPDA does its review.

C-11 Officer Mike Keaney reported that the summer was generally very quiet, but there were some robberies:

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Alex's Market was robbed of \$250; the bicycle used to flee was located and being checked for prints. A woman on Talbot Avenue fought off two young people trying to rob her who were later positively identified and charged. A young man leaving school was confronted at Ashmont and Washington by a group of young men who demanded money and his phone; he was able to provide the name of one of the perpetrators. There was a brief discussion about the failure of expected detail officers to show up at the Bike & Brew event.

In 2009 she put her considerable talent, skills, and experience together to found the nonprofit Artmorpheus, which provides artists with business support and resources. She went on to found the Fairmount Innovation Lab in Uphams Corner, to better serve local
