This year's Dorchester Open Studios, October 24-26, showcases local artists from a variety of disciplines, including music, dance, poetry, painting, photography, sculpture, ceramics, videography, and more, exhibiting at locations throughout Dorchester. All events and activities are free.

The festivities begin on Friday, October 24, from 6 to 9 p.m., with an opening reception and performances at Codman Academy's Black Box Theater. The performances start at 7:15 p.m., with folk singer Bethel Steele, the Jah-N-I Roots Band, Boston Tap Company, the Urban Youth Project dance company, soul/R&B singer/songwriter Aisling Peartree, and more. Theater entrance is on Epping Street, behind the Great Hall.

Studio and group sites are open on Saturday and Sunday, October 25 and 26, from noon to 5 p.m. Maps showing locations, artists, and shuttle stops will be available at all sites, in the community, and at dac-online.org. Among the locations: First Parish Church, on Meeting House Hill; Allen Park, across from First Parish (where graffiti artists will display their techniques on sheets of plywood); the Vietnamese American Community Center, 42 Charles St.; and the Great Hall in Codman Square.

Don and his wife, Ann, were enthusiastic and supportive neighbors throughout their years here: they moved to Ashmont Hill in June 1977 and relocated to a senior living community in March 2013. A priest in the Episcopal Church, Don served in parishes throughout eastern Massachusetts; after he retired, he was priest associate at All Saints' Ashmont. The AHA board sends it sympathies to Ann on behalf of the neighborhood. The service for Don will be at All Saints' on Saturday, November 1, at 2 p.m., with a reception to follow.

September Meeting Notes

At-large City Councilor Michelle Wu gave an update on her activities (she'll be going on maternity leave in December). She is focusing on small business opportunities and support; on homelessness, particularly among young people; on fossil fuel divestment; and on affordable childcare, particulary the needs of workers in the healthcare industry.

C-11 Community Service Officer Mike Keaney reported that a shooting suspect tossed a gun on Ashmont Street, was captured on Alban Street by Youth Violence Task Force members in the area; incident was a drug deal gone bad. Three young Hispanic males punched a man walking towards Peabody Square from the Y; he had in fact been stabbed but was OK; a picture of one assailant

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was obtained from the T and circulated. Kids broke into an empty house on Mellen Street to practice break dancing; one of them had prevously lived in the house. Officer Keaney said there seems to be a jump in violence among kids around the end and beginning of each school year; the Youth Violence Task Force is proactive on such issues.

Andrea Baez, the new executive director of the Dorchester YMCA, described new programs at the Y that are focused on teens. The Y is now open Friday nights until 11:00; kids use the gym and other facilities and and are fed pizza. AAU skills and drills have been added for girls' basketball. Hours will be extended in January; they are considering Saturday night events. They gave out 700 teen memberships over the summer; they're making a real effort to fill the gap when kids are out of school. Programs include SAT prep, a cyber bullying program, and safe dates curriculum. An academic recovery center will help make sure that kids graduate. When Codman Academy kids use the gym in the afternoon, Tech Boston kids are in the fitness facility from 4-6; that's the busiest time of the day. Space can be made available for community meetings and events. She invites everyone to check out the Y; ask for a guest pass at the desk and mention her name.

Trinity Financial's Ashmont Tire project will be going before the BRA and they have asked for a letter of support from AHA. After considerable discussion, the AHA members at the meeting voted to submit a letter of support to the BRA.

Current AHA board members were nominated for another year; former board member David Mooney also was nominated. Vicki discussed the duties of the board and the possibility of reforming some committees. Interest was expressed in updating the neighborhood improvement plan.
