



C-11 Advisory Meetings

Captain Connolly at Boston Police District C-11 holds monthly Advisory Council meetings with one representative from each of the neighborhood organizations within the district; a member of the Ashmont Hill Association board regularly attends. This forum allows people to share concerns and other information specific to their neighborhood with each other as well as the police. And it provides a space in which to discuss police and community matters, identifying common issues and working towards solutions. (A recent topic of discussion has been traffic issues.) June Meeting Notes

From C-11 Community Service Officer Michael Keaney: in May, an individual from Quincy who had walked from Dorchester Avenue to Carmella Lane was observed buying heroin from a seller from Columbia Point; both were arrested. An individual was observed entering a house on Waldorf Street and seen looking into vehicles and trying doors; nothing was reported missing. (A reminder to keep houses and cars locked at all times.) Neighbors mentioned that an individual had been ringing doorbells late at night, but police were not called; Officer Keaney suggested that a call to 911 would have been advisable. Asked about a possible shooting at the T, he said that someone who had cut himself reported that he had been shot. Re: minibikes: police will not pursue, but call 911 to report them, particularly if you know where they come from; a task force is working on the issue.

Candice Gartley, executive director of All Dorchester Sports League, reported that ADSL programs including karate, t-ball, basketball, and cooking are thriving, and the full-day summer program is operating seven days a week, with 60-plus kids coming every day. For info about their programs, go to alldorchesterports.org.

Neighbors Jeffrey Gonyeau, representing Preservation Massachusetts, and Shelly Goehring, from the Massachusetts Housing Partnership and formerly of the Massachusetts Affordable Housing Alliance, gave a presentation about the Community Preservation Act, which will be on the November ballot for Boston voters to decide if the city should participate. If passed, a 1% surcharge on property tax bills would allow Boston to receive state matching funds to support affordable housing, open space and recreation improvements, and historic preservation. A minimum of 10% of funds would be required to be allocated to each of the three categories. Currently, 161 communities participate. The first \$100,000

Dorchester Park Gala Celebrates 125 Years!

A Gala event on Friday, September 9, will celebrate the 125th anniversary of our neighborhood's historic park, which was designed by the Olmsted firm and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The party—to be held under a massive tent in the park—starts at 6 p.m. and includes cocktails, small plates, live music and dancing, and an auction. Proceeds benefit the Dorchester Park Association's efforts to improve the park for everyone to enjoy. Antique & Exotic Car Show & Family Fun Day

This annual free event on Sunday, September 11, caps off the Park's anniversary celebration with fun for all ages. Cars are on display in the lower field on Adams Street from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., with prizes awarded in several categories. Dorchester Bike & Brew

The inaugural Dorchester Bike & Brew Fest takes place on Thursday, September 15, from 5 to 8 p.m., leading into the City of Boston's Hub on Wheels weekend. Hosted by Greater Ashmont Main Street, this family-friendly festival, right in Peabody Square, will showcase Dorchester's growing cycling community, provide an opportunity to sample a number of locally brewed beers, and offer food, live music, workshops, and raffles. A professionally managed "beer garden"

will be set up on the Peabody Square West Plaza, by the Ashmont Grill and Ashmont Cycles. The Peabody Square end of Talbot Avenue will be closed to accommodate a number of food trucks, music by the Second Line New Orleans Jazz Band and Krista Page y Los Super Vatos (Latin Rock), and community information tables. 

Barbara Roper

Long-time neighbor Barbara Roper died on August 11 of complications from Alzheimers' disease. Barbara and George Roper moved to Ashmont Hill in the mid-1960s, raised their four children—Ann, George, Sean, and Michael—here, and have always been strong supporters of the neighborhood and enthusiastic participants in the yard sale. Born in Cork, Ireland, Barbara was known for having the perfect hat for every occasion. She also captured numerous events and people in verse over the years: After one of the first yard sales, she wrote "*The Lure of Ashmont Hill*," which began: *It is a thrill to see crowds mill/Around our yards on Ashmont Hill/To buy our wares — to stop and stare/And say, "Dorchester? We can't be there!"*

in property valuation is exempt from the surcharge; there are also income-based exemptions. (Go to www.cityof-boston.gov/assessing/search/ and type in your street address to see what the surcharge on your tax bill would be for 2016.) If passed by Boston voters, a board made up of representatives from various City agencies and departments would be established to review proposals and make recommendations to the City Council for approval. Funds might be used for such things as restoration, acquisition or reuse of historic properties; creation or restoration of trails, community gardens, parks, playgrounds, sports fields, or open space; construction or rehabilitation of affordable housing, down payments or rental assistance. Funds would also be useful in leveraging other funding sources for such activities. Both Jeff and Shelly expressed support for the issue and encouraged neighbors to learn more at communitypreservation.org or yesbet-terboston.com.

Eli Pimentel from Councilor Andrea Campbell's office gave an update on public safety issues around Ashmont Station/Peabody Square, including trying to get a beat cop, improving lighting on Bailey Street, increasing police presence and patrols. Everyone is

encouraged to fill out the annual City Census that was mailed out; owners of private rental property must register them by July 1.
