

# What to Bring to the Feast:

If you live on the **odd-numbered** side of your street, bring an **appetizer** serving 6-8 to 60R Ocean Street. Know you'll be arriving late to the appetizer course? Drop it off between 5:30 and 6 so it will be there for people to enjoy... or bring a dessert instead.

If you live on the **even-numbered** side of your street, bring a **dessert** serving 6-8. Drop off at 31 Ocean between 5:30 and 6 (no refrigeration) or bring it with you to the dinner.

The appropriate serving utensil for your dish would be greatly appreciated.

Note: Non-alcoholic beverages will be provided. AHA cannot provide alcoholic beverages; you are encouraged to bring your own to enjoy and share.

## June Meeting Notes

Leo Stella from Senator Collins's office discussed the T, the derailment, and their work trying to get more revenue to the T for upgrades. The Fair Share amendment would fund education and transportation infrastructure repairs. There is a 5-year plan to fix the wiring and JFK is now the priority. The City may help to fund a test using electric-powered trains with greater frequency on the Fairmount Line; bus rapid transit with electric buses on

Blue Hill Avenue has also been discussed. Working with Councilor Campbell's office on beat patrols, for which there is money in the budget.

The City's Office of New Urban Mechanics has teamed with the Emerson College Engagement Lab to look at technology and privacy concerns relating to the installation of Soofa signs and other mechanisms in several zones around the city, including in Codman Square.

Officer Keaney from C-11 reported that the Dorchester Day Parade was a success; the additional street barriers at Ocean/Ashmont and Alban/Welles significantly improved traffic flow during the parade. (Thank you, Sgt. Dunford!) Recent incidents: a drug arrest at Alban/Talbot; federal search warrant resulted in a Walton Street resident being charged with significant drug trafficking; drug arrest at Alban/Talbot for intent to distribute. Sixteen new recruits and two transfers add muchneeded new police officers at C-11. The three bike officers, who are mainly around Bowdoin/Geneva, can be invited to come down here. Transit police are allowed to make arrests off T property if incident started on T property.


